We have also completed a major upgrade of the velodrome at Hanson Reserve, to build a facility for local cycling clubs and the wider community, so head there in November for an open day, which will really get Hanson Velodrome into top gear.

We have had a new community garden 'spring' up in Greenacres, which was established through a Fund my Neighbourhood Grant. It will be wonderful to see this garden grow over

time with nurture from the community. 

June


- Discussed an approach to street naming in Enfield, using a selection of Kaurna words and names
- Recommended an e-scooter trial across PAE and neighbouring coastal councils
- Investigated a Greyhound Dog Park session for this breed of dogs to be able be off their leash at a set time

July

- Heard deputation from Australian Naval Institute about the development of a plan for Mutton Cove
- Commenced research with the Environmental Protection Authority to monitor air quality on Lefevre Peninsula
- Considered the installation of electric vehicle charging stations in PAE

August

- Heard deputation from the Australian Anti-Poverty Network about the Newstart Allowance
- Considered many road issues, including road reserve closures, road openings and traffic management
- Accepted a progress report about the Heritage Plaque Scheme, which highlighted interest in the project

REMOTE SENSORS MAKE SENSE

Through the Commonwealth Government's Smart Cities and Suburbs Program we are using smart sensor technology to help us to make ours a truly livable, modern and Smart City. Fifteen bin level sensors have been installed on street litter bins along a section of Lady Gowrie Drive. The sensors allow the driver, with the use of a tablet device, to identify bins that require emptying, and to eliminate the need for unnecessary stops at bins that don't. Sensors on bins on Largs Bay and Semaphore Jetty also reduces unnecessary trips down the jetties to bring the bins to the truck for emptying. This sensor technology will improve our efficiency in waste management, by reducing both costs and carbon emissions, and improving safety for drivers and pedestrians.

Other sensors at Hart's Mill in Port Adelaide and Thomas Turner Reserve in Valley View gather information about heat retention and ground temperature at playgrounds. The data provides information for our shading and open space policies and will ultimately help us improve experiences for you.

Further sensors at Thomas Turner Reserve monitor car park usage, and will help us assess the future need for parking spaces and other resources at this popular community facility.

The possibilities for future use throughout PAE are endless, and the data we gather using smart sensors will equip us to make sound policy and program decisions for your community needs.

CITY PLAN REVIEW

Improving our community

A new Council was elected in November 2018, and in conjunction with the Elected Members, we are now reviewing our City Plan 2030. This overarching, high level plan is an articulation of our purpose as a Council. It captures and presents the aspirations of the people of PAE, Elected Members and staff for the future.

ARTS AND CULTURE PLAN

Celebrating our diversity

Creating opportunities to access and participate in arts and culture is a priority for us and work is underway on a new Arts

and Culture Strategy 2020-2025. Arts and culture plays an important role in delivering the objectives of our City Plan - so we want to make sure we plan well and our strategy is right for PAE now and into the future. We know that art can be used as a tool to help us achieve our goals across all areas of our work - from helping people understand environmental issues to promoting waste reduction to helping people to connect. Because local perspectives and voices are important, we took to the road during July and August, holding consultation sessions at seven locations, with one in each Council ward. These sessions gave real insight into the preferences and cultural interests of our geographically diverse communities. We also had conversations with key artists and arts organisations, community service organisations and businesses across and beyond. Creative interviews were also held in shopping centres in Port Adelaide, Kilburn and Greenacres.

An online survey was developed from the key

findings of the consultations and promoted during August.

The new strategy, which will guide our direction and priories for the next five years will be released in early 2020.

COMMUNITY LAND MANAGEMENT PLANS

Ensuring that council land is fit for purpose

There are more than 700 parcels of Council owned Community Land in the City of PAE. These parcels are generally grouped into categories related to their intended use, with a plan created for each category with a common purpose.

Community Land Management Plans are strategic documents that outline how we propose land that is managed by us to be used by you in the community.

The objectives that are included in each plan, provide a framework and guide our decisions in relation to community land. Performance targets and measures also keep us accountable to the objectives of each plan. We are considering the adoption of further individualised plans for property that does not fit within categorised plans, such as Semaphore Foreshore and Folland Park, as well as additional categorised plans such as coastal foreshore and wetlands.

During engagement processes, we will be seeking feedback about the overall suite of categorised plans and any individualised plans that are proposed.

It is important we obtain your feedback about the plans because they relate to our biggest and most widespread assets, which are our public facilities and spaces. Feedback gathered during the engagement process will influence the way this land is managed and ultimately assist Council in deciding to adopt or amend the draft plans. Consultation will open in September with further information, including copies of all draft plans currently available on our website. ensure that all members of our community, community, access our services and products, and be considered in the work that we undertake.

Work on our Inclusive Communities Plan has been underway for the past year, with community and staff having had opportunity to share their thoughts about ways we can strengthen inclusion and access for all. The Plan spans seven key areas; Commitment, Advocacy, Culture, Built Environment, Products & Services, Communications & Marketing, and Information Communication Technology. Comments about the draft plan can be submitted until the end of October.



This tax will increase to \$140 per tonne on I January 2020 which means that for the estimated 27,850 tonnes of waste from PAE going to landfill in the next financial year we will be paying a Solid Waste Levy of \$3.48 million.

So we need your help to not only reduce landfill, but to also reduce these costs.

The best way to reduce household waste to landfill is to use the green bin for food waste.


By using your kitchen caddy you can reduce waste sent to landfill

INCLUSIVE EVENTS AT PAE LIBRARIES

Making access easier

Our Libraries offer a range of events and programs to meet the diverse needs of our community.

Following the success of Multicultural Storytime earlier in the year at Greenacres, we ran new sessions at Enfield, Parks and again at Greenacres Library in August.

Featuring interactive songs and stories in Chinese, Hindi and Korean, we welcome people from all cultures to these sessions.

Each of our libraries is accessible by wheelchair and Parks Library also has a Changing Places, an adult changing facility accessible with a MLAK system key that enables people with a disability direct access to these facilities.

GOING UNDERGROUND

letty Road Upgrades

The City of PAE is working with SA Power Networks to underground power along the western section of Jetty Road, Largs Bay between the Esplanade and Military Road. The undergrounding works by SA Power Networks is currently underway and is expected to be completed by December 2019. This is a great opportunity for PAE to undertake a streetscape upgrade of this historically significant road.

Our placemaking, engineering and heritage staff have been working with a group of local residents to develop a concept plan and construction will commence in the 2020-2021 financial year.

The concept includes improved road layout, parking, landscaping, lighting, outdoor dining

opportunities, wider footpaths, renewal of the road pavement and the creation of both permanent and temporary public artworks that reflect the area and highlight the history. We have been working with SA Power Networks and local residents during the consultation period for the undergrounding portion of this project, and there will be further opportunity for input on the placemaking aspect of this project soon.


PLANTING AT PLANO

Making a difference on White Ribbon Day

In 2015, PAE became the first council in the state to achieve White Ribbon Accreditation for our commitment to promoting a culture of respectful relationships with a zero tolerance of violence against women.

As a community leader, we believe we have a role in driving social change and leading by example when it comes to the support and protection of women.

Being part of the White Ribbon program has helped us to reflect on and adapt our organisational culture, policies, procedures and how we can support those affected by family violence and provide our employees with



education, awareness, knowledge and skills in addressing violence against women.

To recognise White Ribbon Day on Friday 22 November this year, we will be planting a claret ash tree at a public event to be held at Plano Park, Clearview.

This tree is a meaningful choice, as it symbolises new beginnings and rebirth. Like all deciduous trees, the claret ash will lose its leaves in the cold months but blossoms anew in spring. The location is also significant, being a high volume traffic area, that connects the eastern part of PAE to the entry to the coast. The tree is currently being cared for at our depot, and as it matures will bring a splash of its purple red colour to the site.

CLUBROOMS ON POINT

Upgrades create sporting opportunities for girls

We are working with the Government of South Australia and local sporting clubs to help the next generation of football players on Lefevre Peninsula. The newly refurbished clubroom and new female changing rooms for Port District Football Club at Largs Reserve will benefit local girls who are keen to play footy. These improvements have resulted in greater equality

and inclusion throughout the club, as well as improved disabled access to amenities. It is also expected that more teams will be using the improved spaces for training, meetings and events.

This upgraded community facility was designed and project managed by PAE in consultation with the Port District Football Club, and funded by a \$120,000 State Government grant.

ON THE ROAD

Inspecting and improving our roads for the future

During September we'll be undertaking a condition assessment of our 692km road network. Occuring every four years, this review provides data to help our engineers determine the required budget, treatment type, and year for works. Monitoring the condition of our road network ensures this important asset is maintained in a safe and cost effective manner. You may see these vehicles out and about, as they are clearly identifiable with their numerous roof top cameras and other road assessment equipment

They are driven by experienced operators and traveling at normal traffic speeds with hazard lighting and other warning devices.



GAME, SET, MATCH!

Online access to local courts

Access to courts at Greenacres Tennis Club has recently been improved with the help of a Federal Government grant to create an innovative online booking platform that has opened up tennis to more people than ever before. By using digital technologies to attract and retain participants, Tennis Australia's new online booking system will not only boost participation and physical activity, but can deliver strong health, social, psychological and economic benefits as well.

DRIVING ENVIRONMENTAL CHANGE

Turning recycled plastic into new roads

We are working with Fulton Hogan to turn the equivalent of 140,000 recycled plastic bags into 110 tonnes of new road in Glanville. PlastiPhalt® was developed and manufactured by Fulton Hogan using waste plastic that would formerly have gone to landfill, and is the first large scale use of this material in the State. The plastic is dissolved within bitumen and no free plastic particles are released into the environment during this process, which is similar to adding sugar into your tea, to become one substance once combined.

The bitumen mix also includes 20% recycled asphalt pavement.

The use of recycled plastic in asphalt mixes not only helps to deal with an environmental problem, but it also makes our roads smoother, safer and more economical.

This recycling project aligns with PAE's commitment to sustainable transport and roadworks solutions.

DIGITAL SPRINGBOARD

Landing local jobs

In a partnership with SA Public Libraries, Infoxchange and Google, PAE Libraries has launched a series of workshops designed to improve digital skills, open up new employment and career opportunities and build confidence. Over the past few months, we've worked with a number of groups, including local organisation Novita, to support the development of individual and business skills.

The Digital Springboard course is free and contains practical tips for CV and interview skills, assistance to explore ideas to get your small business idea off the ground, and social media advice amd guidaance for getting your message out there.

These sessions have inspired many, and we have received success stories from workshop participants who have already secured jobs. Digital Springboard is just one part of what Libraries can offer, and more courses are coming soon For more information:

STORMWATER FLOWS

In the lead up to winter this year we had a big cleanup of stormwater infrastructure to ensure that it flows freely.

While we maintain the system all year round, litter is always a problem as big downpours bring litter from the streets into the stormwater drains. While a lot of this smelly and dirty work goes unseen, it is vital to ensure that when the rain comes, water can drain away to where it needs to go.

This is especially important as our coastal and river areas receive stormwater from systems right across Adelaide.

Since the Seed Library opened at Greenacres Library, over 500 seeds have been "borrowed" by 470 green-thumbed customers.

Congratulations to two local PAE businesses that picked up Brand South Australia Fast Mover awards for their creative, innovative and industrious business practices.

Taking number one spot was Next Gen Flooring, a commercial flooring contractor established in 2015 by directors Trav Bird, Craig Cooper and Luke Skoblyk.

Third place was awarded to after-sales machinery company Crusher Parts International, founded by Daniel Ritchie in 2015, which this year exprienced a 189% growth in revenue.

BARTON RESERVE UPGRADES

Improving safety in open spaces

Barton Reserve in Blair Athol is used by local families as well as children from the nearby St Paul Lutheran School. We have just completed construction of a new fence right around the reserve to prevent children running out into the road.

The entrance remains wide and open, and is located underneath a sign designed by students from the school.



We've recently been awarded funding by the National Motor Vehicle Theft Reduction Council to help spread the word about vehicle theft and how to prevent it. One of the simplest steps you can take to protect your car is to store your keys out of view and away from external doors and windows.

There is also a new wheelchair accessible ramp that replaces the muddy hill used by teachers, students and parents to access the reserve. This project was designed and constructed by PAE in consultation with the local community to ensure that it meets local needs. Funding was received from the State Government to complete this project.

FOOTPATH GRINDING

Preventing trip hazards on local footpaths

A footpath grinding trial was recently conducted at Northfield. Grinding is a way to remove trip hazards from concrete footpaths at a far lower cost than re-laying an otherwise good section of path. It also greatly extends the life of footpath segments which have shifted over time due to ground movement or tree

We have over 1,200km of footpaths in PAE

which is equivalent to the distance from Adelaide to Sydney.

Every four years we obtain detailed video imaging and condition assessment of every centimetre. Last year, following a full audit of footpaths and hazards across PAE, the trial was started, and if successful wil be extended throughout the region.

STATEWIDE PLANNING REFORM

New planning system on the way

Planning and development rules provide the foundations for where we live and work, what we live in, what we can build if we are land owners or developers, and what opportunities we get to have a say on what our neighbours want to do with their land.

The State Government will soon be consulting on reforms to the new Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016 (PDI) which will replace the existing Development Act 1993. It will re-write the zoning provisions of South Australia's 68 Council based Development Plans into one statewide 'rule book' for all. Every property will have its planning provisions and zoning modified to some degree by the revocation of Council's Development Plan and its replacement with the State-wide Planning and Design Code.

The State Government's consultation on the Code, as it will apply to our Council area will commence in October 2019, with it intended to come into operation in July 2020.

100 YEARS OF FLYING HIGH

Tuesday 12 November 2019 marks the 100-year anniversary of the famous flight from England to Australia in a Vickers Vimy bomber, by Semaphore born Ross Smith. He was one of our most highly decorated war veterans from WWI, serving in

Gallipoli and Romani (in the Sinai), and took part in attacks, aerial photography missions, and bombing raids, and on one occasion even landed in the face of the enemy to rescue a downed comrade. During his extensive war service, Smith was awarded the Air Force Cross, twice awarded the Military Cross, and received the Distinguished Flying Cross three times. While still with the flying corps, he made pioneering flights between Cairo, Calcutta, and Timor in his twin-engine Handley

On 12 November 1919, assisted by his brother Keith and two mechanics, Wally Shiers and Jim Bennett, he set out from

England to Australia in a large Vickers Vimy bomber. It was an epic 28-day flight, completed at an average speed of 137kms per hour, but not without mishap. On their arrival, the pioneering flyers were welcomed home as national heroes; their £10,000 prize money was shared equally and the two brothers were knighted. In 1922, while preparing for a recordbreaking around the world flight, Ross Smith, who was not yet 30 and Bennett were killed in a crash.

Their famous Vimy aircraft is on display at Adelaide Airport, and PAE Council is considering erecting a suitable memorial in PAE to honour his bravery.
